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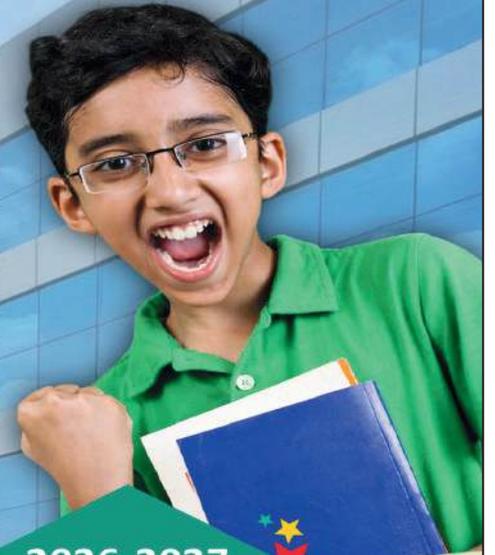

The 8th driverless Yellow Line metro train reached Hebbagodi depot. Trial runs soon, commercial operations from February, improving frequency to 7-8 minutes for Electronic City commuters.

Broken roads and open drains continue to trouble residents of KIADB Layout, Electronic City Phase-2. Daily inconvenience persists as basic infrastructure remains neglected. When will authorities finally repair these roads?

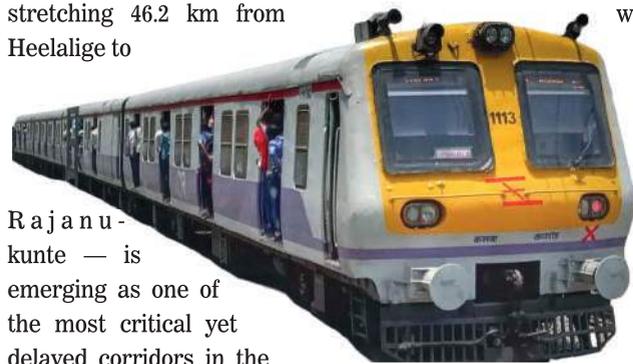
Kanaka Line: The Long Road to Bengaluru's North-South Rail Spine

The Kanaka Line of the Bengaluru Suburban Rail Project — infrastructure major L&T exited the civil works contract, forcing K-RIDE to re-work execution plans.

Land acquisition has been another persistent bottleneck. While the Mallye Line has completed land handover, the Kanaka corridor still awaits clearances from KIADB and South Western Railway, slowing on-ground progress. Additionally, procurement of metro-like coaches — expected to take nearly two years — remains pending key approvals.

Despite these challenges, the Kanaka Line is seen as a game-changer for decongesting arterial roads and reducing dependence on private vehicles. As Bengaluru's commute crisis deepens, timely execution of this corridor could determine whether suburban rail becomes a solution — or another missed opportunity.

Originally targeted for completion by October 2026, the Kanaka Line now carries a revised deadline of June 2029, reflecting broader delays across the 148-km suburban rail network. One of the major setbacks occurred in March 2025, when



Rajankunte — is emerging as one of the most critical yet delayed corridors in the city's ambitious commuter rail plan. Designed to connect fast-growing southern suburbs with the northern employment hubs, the line is expected to serve thousands of daily commuters from Electronic City, Yelahanka and surrounding industrial clusters.

Hosur Airport Rejection Hits South Bengaluru Hard



The Union Ministry of Defence's decision to once again reject the proposed Hosur greenfield airport has come as a major setback—not only for Tamil Nadu, but also for Electronic City and Bengaluru South, which stood to gain significantly from the project.

Located barely 35-40 km from Electronic City, the Hosur airport was seen as a practical alternative to Kempegowda International Airport (KIA), which lies over 55 km away. For lakhs of IT professionals working in Electronic City, Bommasandra, and surrounding industrial zones, the airport would have meant shorter travel times, reduced congestion, and better global connectivity. Its rejection ensures that South Bengaluru remains among the worst-connected major employment hubs in the city when it comes to aviation access.

The decision also highlights a deeper infrastructure imbalance. While North Bengaluru has benefited from sustained

investment around KIA, South Bengaluru continues to lag in large-scale transport and mobility projects. The absence of a nearby airport increases pressure on already congested corridors such as Hosur Road, Silk Board, NICE Road, and ORR, affecting daily commute times and quality of life.

For businesses in Electronic City—home to major IT, biotech, and manufacturing firms—the setback may impact future investment decisions, business travel efficiency, and the region's attractiveness as a global tech destination.

Beyond mobility, the Hosur airport had the potential to drive balanced urban growth along the EC-Attibele-Hosur corridor. With the proposal shelved again, South Bengaluru's long-standing demand for equitable infrastructure development remains unresolved, reinforcing the urgent need for a second airport that genuinely serves the city's southern regions.



Namma Metro Yellow Line Gears Up for Launch as 8th Driverless Train

Bengaluru's much-anticipated Namma Metro Yellow Line has moved closer to operational readiness with the arrival of its 8th driverless train set (TS#8) at the Hebbagodi depot on Monday. The induction of additional rolling stock signals steady progress toward the launch of services on the crucial RV Road-Delta Electronics, Bommasandra corridor.

In a significant interim boost for commuters, Bangalore Metro Rail Corporation Limited (BMRCL) has already inducted the 7th train set on the Yellow Line, leading to improved peak-hour services. The revised schedule came into effect on 15 January 2026, enhancing service frequency during high-demand periods. Peak-hour trains now run every 10 minutes from Monday to Saturday, improved from the earlier 13-minute gap, while Sunday frequency has been tightened to 14 minutes, compared to 15 minutes earlier.

The Yellow Line is expected to play a transformative role in easing congestion along Hosur Road, connecting major residential and employment hubs such as BTM Layout,

Silk Board, Bommanahalli, Electronic City, Infosys, Biocon, and Hebbagodi. Once fully operational, the corridor is likely to significantly cut travel time for thousands of daily commuters working in the IT and industrial zones of south Bengaluru.

BMRCL has indicated that trial runs will begin shortly, with commercial operations targeted from February, subject to statutory approvals. Initial services are expected to operate at a 7-8 minute frequency as more train sets are commissioned.

Meanwhile, Yellow Line train sets TS#9 and TS#10 are scheduled for dispatch in March, while DTG train sets TS#17 and TS#18 for Phase 1 of the Green Line are expected in February. Oscillation trials of the driverless prototype on the Green Line have been completed, and BMRCL is awaiting the RDSO report, after which approvals from CMRS and CCRS will follow.

With rolling stock induction accelerating, the Yellow Line is firmly on track to become a game-changer for south Bengaluru's urban mobility.

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BASAPURA LAKE 2: A VANISHING LIFELINE IN SOUTH BENGALURU

Basapura Lake 2, located in the rapidly growing Electronic City-Basapura belt, is fighting for survival. Once a serene water body supporting ground-water recharge, birds, fish, and a thriving local ecosystem, the lake today stands severely polluted and neglected—raising alarm among residents and environmental activists.

At the heart of the crisis is the unchecked inflow of untreated sewage, which has turned the lake into a stagnant, foul-smelling pool. Residents report frequent fish deaths, disappearance of birdlife, and increasing health concerns for people living nearby. What was once a community space for walkers and

families has now become a symbol of urban apathy.

The issue has sparked a citizen-led movement, with a petition titled “Save Basapura Lake 2” gaining momentum on Change.org. The petition urges BBMP and concerned authorities to ensure proper functioning of sewage treatment plants, prevent direct sewage discharge, and take up scientific lake rejuvenation.

Basapura Lake 2 is not just a local issue—it reflects a larger pattern of how Bengaluru’s lakes are being sacrificed to unplanned urbanisation. As water scarcity looms large over the city, protecting existing lakes is no longer optional; it is essential.

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TURNING “WASTE” INTO GROWTH

At Mantri Espana, Kariammana Agrahara Road (Opposite Raghavendra Studio Rooms), Bellandur, we are witnessing a simple yet powerful sustainability story come to life.

and injections, allowing the body to heal naturally while maintaining joint health. With proper guidance, monitored progression, and objective return-to-sport criteria, many athletes can safely resume their sport with confidence.

The key lies in early assessment, individualized rehab planning, and supervised sports-specific training. ACL injury does not always mean the end of sports participation. With the right rehabilitation approach, returning to an active, pain-free sporting life is possible—without surgery, without drugs, and with long-term joint health in mind.

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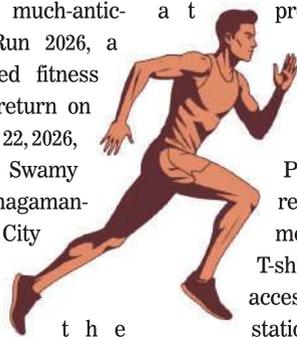
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BHARAT RUN 2026 - FEBRUARY 22ND
